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### **SUNY Cortland to Hold Undergraduate Commencement Ceremonies on May 17**

SUNY Cortland will conduct two undergraduate Commencement ceremonies — one at 9:30 a.m. and the other at 2:30 p.m. — on Saturday, May 17, in Park Center Alumni Arena.

An estimated 1,325 seniors will receive baccalaureate degrees during Commencement exercises, which will be presided over by President Erik J. Bitterbaum.

Thomas Goodale '61, a SUNY Cortland Distinguished Alumnus and renowned expert in the field of recreation and leisure studies, will address the graduates at both ceremonies. The State University of New York will bestow upon Goodale an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters during Commencement. Each ceremony begins with an academic procession. A prelude, processional and recessional music will be provided by the Cortland Brass Ensemble.

President Erik J. Bitterbaum will deliver the charge to graduates.

During the morning ceremony, Arden Zipp, chemistry emeritus, will carry the mace, a ceremonial staff used as a symbol of institutional authority at Commencement and academic convocations. Four multi-colored gonfalons, representing the All College, the School of Arts and Sciences, the School of Education and the School of Professional Studies, will be carried, respectively, by Robert Rhodes, Anglo-Irish literature emeritus; Barry Batzing, biological sciences; Emilie Kudela, childhood/early childhood education; and Joy Hendrick, kinesiology.

Senior musical theatre major Audra Rizzo will sing the national anthem and senior musical theatre major Jennifer Vadella will sing the Alma Mater.

Richard Wheeler, physics, will carry the mace during the afternoon Commencement. The gonfaloniers will be: Dale Anderson, recreation and leisure studies; Sanford Gutman, history; Sheila Cohen, literacy; and K. Michael Kniffen, physical education.

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### Graduate Commencement Set for May 16 in Park Center

The SUNY Cortland Commencement ceremony for students earning master's degrees and certificates of advanced study is scheduled for Friday, May 16, at 7 p.m. in Park Center Alumni Arena.

The College will award 307 master's degrees and 38 certificates of advanced study. After the ceremony, a reception for the graduates and their guests will take place in the Corey Gymnasium.

An academic procession will open the Commencement. Faculty Senate Chair Karla Alwes, English, will be the mace bearer.

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#### **Prus Named Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs**

Mark Prus, the dean of the School of Arts and Sciences since July 2002, will become the provost and vice president for academic affairs on July 1.

Prus, who was hired following a national search, will replace Elizabeth Davis-Russell, who will retire on June 30.

As provost and vice president for academic affairs, Prus will be the chief academic officer and will provide leadership and vision to the schools of Arts and Sciences, Education and Professional Studies. He also will oversee athletics, enrollment management, graduate studies, information resources, institutional research and assessment, international programs, intercultural and gender studies, outdoor and environmental education and research and sponsored programs.

A native of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, Prus grew up in North Canton, Ohio. He graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Notre Dame and earned a doctorate in economics from the University of Utah. He studied for his Ph.D. on a University of Utah Teaching Fellowship and a Marriner S. Eccles Fellowship in Political Economy.

Prus joined the Economics Department faculty in 1990 as a visiting assistant professor after having taught at SUNY Potsdam for five years. Two years later, he was promoted to associate professor. He attained the rank of professor in 2001.

From January-July 2002, Prus served as interim associate dean of the School of Arts and Sciences. He served as interim dean from July 2002 until March 2004, when he was permanently appointed to the position.

As dean, he has been responsible for overseeing a \$14 million budget for 18 academic departments and one interdisciplinary center. His responsibilities include curriculum development and planning, and faculty recruitment, development and evaluation.

The Chancellor's Award process begins at each of the 64 SUNY campuses with nominations submitted by the respective presidents. The SUNY Committee on Awards then reviews the nominations and makes its recommendations.

Barclay of Groton, N.Y., who joined the Geology Department in 1999, becomes the 49th SUNY Cortland faculty member to receive the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching.

Promoted to associate professor in 2005, Barclay has developed and taught courses that fulfill the College's General Education requirements

#### Michael D. Berzonsky

Berzonsky of Homer, N.Y., who joined the College's Psychology Department in 1971, becomes the seventh SUNY Cortland faculty member to receive the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Scholarship and Creative Activities.

His social-cognitive theoretical model of identity has been widely studied and tested and has fostered its own impressive body of research among other scholars in the field. International colleagues universally recognize his scientific rigor, keen vision, wisdom and magnanimity. Some have called Berzonsky "one of the five most productive identity researchers of his generation."

#### Ellen S. Jampole

Jampole of Cortland, who joined the College in 1990, becomes the fifth SUNY Cortland faculty member to receive the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Faculty Service.

Currently a professor and graduate coordinator of literacy, she has provided outstanding leadership and service to the College Reading Association (CRA), an international organization founded by and for literacy experts in 1958.

#### Ellen T. McCabe

McCabe of Binghamton, N.Y., a senior assistant librarian in Memorial Library since 2004, becomes the fifth SUNY Cortland librarian to receive the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Librarianship.

As the College's humanities bibliographer and cataloger, she provides instructional services, research assistance and materials selection assistance to more than 30 undergraduate and graduate-level programs. McCabe has offered dozens of instructional sessions for these programs on using the library effectively, using online databases, finding primary documents online and using digital images in research. She teaches courses on computer information retrieval and participates in the Composition Library Instruction Program.

#### Nanette M. Pasquarello

Pasquarello of Cortlandville, N.Y., a professional staff member at SUNY Cortland since 1991, becomes the 20th SUNY Cortland staff member to receive the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Professional Service.

She joined SUNY Cortland in 1991 as a transfer credit coordinator and senior admissions counselor. She also previously held positions as associate director of alumni affairs, career counselor and technical support specialist and interim director of judicial affairs. Her extraordinary performance and passion for helping students led her to apply for the permanent director of judicial affairs position to which she was appointed in 2003.

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### Faculty Senate Sets Meeting to Consider GE Assessment Plan

The Faculty Senate voted to hold a special meeting on May 13 specifically to consider the General Education Assessment Plan.

Senators, in what would have been their last meeting of the spring semester on May 6 in the Park Center Hall of Fame Room, had started their voting on approving the GE assessment plan. But Senator Howard Botwinick, economics, pointed out that the vote violated Senate policy. He noted that the document had not been shared with the Senate at its previous meeting and, therefore, could not be approved at the current meeting.

Senator David Ritchie, library, asked Senate Chair Karla Alwes, English, if the proposed plan could be shared electronically as soon as possible with all the faculty.

Alwes assured Ritchie that the document would be disseminated by e-mail. Senators voted to hold the special meeting in the Park Center Hall of Fame Room beginning at 1:10 p.m.

In other action, the Senate discussed the concept of creating an ad hoc committee to study the composition and purpose of a Professional Affairs Committee, a standing committee that would be the functional equivalent of the Faculty Affairs Committee on the Senate.

The idea emerged from the recent Review of Governance Committee's recommendations. Surveys conducted by the committee revealed

They include changes to the SGA constitution as well as funding allocations totaling \$327,000 to support activities of several student clubs, future campus-wide special events, student club transportation needs, and to create an endowment fund for campus leadership activities and programs.

strong support for the concept. The committee offered one possible composition of the proposed Professional Affairs Committee with a chair elected from all professional staff and one representative each from enrollment management, student affairs, information resources, academic affairs and finance and management/institutional advancement.

Botwinick, who chaired the committee, emphasized that this was only a suggestion and that it would be entirely up to the professionals to decide for themselves the final composition.

Senator Amy Dahlman, EOP, said that she would like to see two representatives added; one each for coaches and for directors.

Some discussion centered on whether an ad hoc committee could officially conduct work during the summer when the Faculty Senate is not in session. Ultimately, the Senate agreed that that there was not enough time left in the semester to form an ad hoc committee and to have it approved by the full Senate.

# **Campus Rejects Proposed Faculty Senate Makeover**

A College-wide referendum on a proposed restructuring of the Faculty Senate failed to garner the necessary two-thirds vote to make the change, the Senate Committee on Committees reported via campus e-mail on May 1.

The committee received 235 ballots, with 118 voters favoring the new model and 117 voting against the plan.

In other balloting, the Faculty Senate officers for the 2008-09 academic year were chosen.

Kathleen Lawrence, communication studies, received 130 of the 136 ballots cast for vice chair, while Janet Duncan, foundations and social advocacy, received 141 of 142 votes for secretary and John Shedd, history, tallied 138 of 142 ballots for treasurer.

Current Vice Chair William Buxton, literacy, will be the Faculty Senate chair.

### Lynn Couturier Joins College as Physical Education Chair

Lynn Couturier, head of the Health and Physical Education Department at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, will join SUNY Cortland on Monday, Aug. 4, as professor and chair of the Physical Education Department.

Couturier of Griswold, Conn., will replace Jerome Casciani, who has overseen the department almost continuously since 1990 and who will retire on Aug. 30.

Reporting to the dean of professional studies, Couturier will direct one of the largest undergraduate physical education teacher education programs in the country. The Physical Education Department is the largest department on campus in terms of the number of majors served, including roughly 950 undergraduate and graduate students.

Couturier is charged with managing and advocating for a complex program with a growing and evolving graduate curriculum as well as working to enhance diversity on the campus. She will serve as department chair to 16 full-time and 20 part-time faculty members, as well as student teacher supervisors. She is responsible for the teaching supervision of the 18 coaches in the Athletics Department, whose duties include teaching part time in the Physical Education Department.

At the New London, Conn.-based Coast Guard Academy since 2003, Couturier leads a program where students must meet Coast Guard professional competencies and enhance their knowledge of fitness and wellness and develop skills necessary for participation in lifetime physical activity.

She supervises 13 full-time faculty members while teaching courses, providing program leadership, managing the department budget, administering the physical fitness examination for the entire student body each semester and providing oversight for the summer program. She serves on the Dean's Cabinet, Academic Council and the Labor-Management Relations Committee.

She earned a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education from Springfield College in 1981 and became certified to teach kindergarten through 12th grade physical education and health. She received a Master of Science in Biomechanics from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana, Ill., in 1985 and a Doctor of Physical Education from Springfield College in 1986. Her doctoral dissertation was on "Exercise as a Predictor of Body-Cathexis and Self-Concept in Pregnant Women." Couturier also obtained a Graduate Certificate in Advanced Feminist Studies from the University of Massachusetts in 2002 and a Master of Arts in American Studies, with honors, from Trinity College in 2007. ### Retirements

#### **Jerome Casciani**

Jerome Casciani, who during his 38 years of service at SUNY Cortland has fulfilled the roles of teacher, coach, department chair and College administrator, will retire on Aug. 30. He has earned the designation of associate professor emeritus of physical education.

Casciani has chaired the Physical Education Department for a total of 16 years since 1990. During the 1997-98 academic year, he served as interim dean of the School of Professional Studies.

A native of Niagara Falls, N.Y., Casciani earned a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education from Springfield College. He obtained a Master of Education in Physical Education from The Pennsylvania State University and a doctorate from West Virginia University, where he focused his physical education studies on motor development.

Before joining SUNY Cortland, Casciani was chairman of health and physical education for the Northeastern School District in York County, Pa. He also taught at Baltimore Junior College, Manhasset High School, York (Pa.) Junior College, and in the public school system of Manhasset and York County. He was an assistant football coach at Manhassett High School.

Casciani joined the College in 1970 as an instructor and was promoted to the rank of assistant professor three years later. He was named associate professor in 1981.

In 1990, he became chair of a reorganized Physical Education Department, one of the largest undergraduate programs of its kind in the U.S. He was interim dean of professional studies during 1997-98, at the time the school was newly reorganized for improved coordination and efficiency in its curriculum and intercollegiate athletic program. He has chaired his department since 2001.

At SUNY Cortland, he has taught Research Methods, Graduate Readings, and Readings in

Physical Education. He has made professional presentations in his field at the local, state and national level. His research has focused on high-performance learning teams in the college classroom.

Casciani was SUNY Cortland's head lacrosse coach from 1984-90, during which time his Red Dragons posted a 60-44 win-loss record, made six National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) appearances and never lost a league contest while capturing four State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) titles. He also has been an assistant coach in lacrosse, football and wrestling at the College.

He served his department, school and College on numerous committees. His department committee work included the Provost Work Group to Restructure the Physical Education Department. He also was active in evaluations of his department in the areas of curriculum, teacher certification program selection, department personnel advisory and the sports camp.

Casciani represented his school as a member and chair of the Division/School Personnel Committee and on numerous other committees. His all-college service included participation as a justice on the Judicial Review Board and on the College Writing Committee for many years. He was a member of the Search Committee for President (1994), the President's Task Force on Restructuring the College (1992), the Center for Wellness Advisory Committee, the Francis J. Woods Fitness Facility Development Committee, the Search Committee for Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) Director, the Cortland Intercollegiate Athletic Board and the C-Club Advisory Committee.

He served on the Applied Sciences
Laboratories Planning Subcommittee of the
Multi-disciplinary Sports Medicine Center at
SUNY Upstate Medical Center at Syracuse.
Casciani also has represented the College in
professional groups including the Council of
Administrators, New York State Association of
Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.

He will continue to teach part time at the College and resides in Cortland, N.Y., with his wife, Judith Lee. They have two grown children, Christopher and Jennifer, and four grandchildren.

#### **Dale Anderson**

Dale Anderson, who served as a lecturer on the SUNY Cortland Recreation and Leisure Studies faculty since 1998, will retire on Aug. 31. He has been designated lecturer emeritus of recreation and leisure studies.

He joined the College as a full-time visiting assistant professor and has served as a full-time lecturer since 2000.

Anderson has made national, regional, state and local professional presentations. He was a member of the Raquette Lake Outdoor Education Committee, a coordinator for the SUNY Cortland Outdoor Opportunities Program and a core committee member for the SUNY Cortland Community Bikes Project.

Since 2004, Anderson has been a snowboard instructor for Greek Peek Mountain Resort in Virgil, N.Y., where he specializes in working with persons with disabilities.

In 2005, Anderson received a Leadership for Civic Engagement Award for his involvement in the community bike program from the Civic Engagement Student Development Committee.

Born and raised in St. Paul, Minn., Anderson received his bachelor's degree in physical education

and biology from Minnesota State University at Mankato and a master's degree in physical education from the University of North Dakota.

From 1975-98, he was an assistant professor in the health, physical education and recreation department at the University of North Dakota.

Anderson is certified by the American Association of Snowboard Instructors, the American Canoe Association, Wilderness Medical Associates and the National Alliance for Youth Sports.

In the community, Anderson serves as a Team Challenge Program facilitator with the Cayuga Nature Center in Ithaca, N.Y., and a cross-country ski instructor for the Cornell Outdoor Education Program.

Anderson resides in Cortland, N.Y., with his wife, Lynn Anderson, chair of the Recreation and Leisure Studies Department. They have a son, Cory, in his junior year at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y., and a daughter, Kelly, who recently entered the banking business and lives in Lincoln. N.H.

Upon retirement he plans to become a recreational pilot, to compete in windsurfing events and to pursue snowboarding.

Tooker also will give this presentation at the Twelfth Consultation of the International Consortium for Research in Science and Mathematics Education, being held May 13 -16 in Quito, Ecuador. Tooker, Cirmo and Duncan were all participants in the June 2007 SUNY Cortland Academic Study Tour to Capital Normal University in Beijing, China.

Arden Zipp, chemistry emeritus, recently led a team of six teachers in the marking of the National Chemistry Olympiad (NCO) exam at the American Chemical Society's Examinations Institute in Milwaukee, Wis. The exam consisted of a 60-item multiple choice paper, an eight question free response exam, and a laboratory exercise consisting of two activities. The grading team narrowed the field of almost 900 high school chemistry students who took the exam to a group of 20 who will attend a two-week study camp at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo. These students will receive intensive instruction in advanced chemistry topics in both classroom and laboratory settings and will take a series of exams to identify four individuals to represent the United States in the International Chemistry Olympiad that will be held in mid-July in Budapest, Hungary.
